What I think about detail 1:

In CONVERSATION, FM is following, questioning, inexperienced, unsure.
RW is self-assured, knowledgeable, experienced, confident.

What I think about detail 2:

The words the narrator (Mrs. Macomber?) uses to DESCRIBE RW make him appear tough, masculine, experienced, confident.

What I think about detail 3:

The words the narrator (Mrs. Macomber?) uses to DESCRIBE FM make him appear good looking and sporty in a qualified, safe, inexperienced, and artificial way.

How I connect In conversation and the way they are described, RW and FM are contrasted sharply. **the details:**

I state a conclusion that I have come to and can support with evidence from the text after reading and thinking about it closely.

My claim about the text:

At the beginning of "The Short Happy Life of Francis Macomber," Hemingway's use of dialogue and physical description set up a sharp contrast between Wilson as a tough, experienced, assertive outdoorsman and Macomber as an inexperienced, unsure novice.
